Supportive Services for Veteran Families

A powerful testament to the strength and resilience of the human spirit, Phillip Hudnall's journey is a powerful reminder that with determination and a little support from others, we can overcome even the greatest challenges.

Phillip started with the Supportive Services for Veteran Families Program in April 2024. He entered the program ready to take back control of his life. He secured housing, and within a week, he had successfully re-entered the workforce by obtaining employment. Mr. Hudnall continued to work hard, but one significant obstacle was still in his way: transportation. For months Mr. Hudnall walked to and from work daily, while saving every penny he could.

While holding on to the hope of finding a vehicle that would offer him more freedom and opportunities, Phillip's luck took a turn.



While walking home from work, Mr. Hudnall came across a vehicle that he noticed had been sitting on the street for some time. He took the chance and approached the owner to see if the car could be for sale. The owner offered Mr. Hudnall a deal that just so happened to be the exact amount he had saved to purchase a vehicle.

This was a major turning point for Phillip, but what makes this story so inspiring is that he completed this milestone on his own. SSVF does not purchase vehicles, licenses, or insurance, but SSVF supports veterans by assisting with breaking barriers of homelessness that will allow them to become more self-sufficient. Phillip's hard work and dedication made it happen. It was a moment that showed his incredible strength and independence.

Mr. Hudnall's success is a beacon of hope for anyone who has ever felt like they've hit rock bottom. He has exceeded all expectations, and his journey proves that no matter how far you fall, you can always find your way back to a place of strength, dignity, and success. 

Family Stabilization

In May 2025, PRIDE took a bold step toward expanding our mission by applying for the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) to serve Kanawha County. Just one month later, PRIDE was thrilled to learn that the application had been approved! The same day, office space was secured within the American Job Center—our new home base in Kanawha County.

In that moment, our team jumped into action! Staff worked tirelessly to set up welcoming offices, brought new team members on board, connected with community partners, and residents. The energy and enthusiasm has been incredible as we continue to launch the CSBG Program in this new area. We could not be more excited to serve and support the people of Kanawha County. The opportunity to make a difference in the community has truly been a blessing. Our Kanawha County office opened it's doors in mid-August, and since that time, we have proudly assisted over 150 low-income individuals and families with utility terminations, employment supports, and housing assistance. Through our Family Stabilization Program, we now offer comprehensive case management services that include financial literacy education, linkages to additional resources, support for educational goals, and housing assistance. The goal of this program is to empower clients to achieve lasting self-sufficiency.

As PRIDE continues to grow, we remain committed to building strong partnerships and creating pathways to success for those we serve. We are deeply grateful for the warm welcome we've received in Kanawha County and look forward to many more opportunities to uplift, empower, and inspire individuals and families in the years ahead.

New Playground Equipment

New playground structures have been installed at both Chapmanville Primary & Buffalo Elementary. The vibrant new play areas encourage gross motor development and feature built-in educational elements such as shapes and rulers. They have quickly became favorites among the students, and allow teachers to extend learning beyond the classroom.



Enhanced Safety

Additionally, new intercom systems have been installed at the Logan Center, enabling teachers to identify and communicate with the visitors before they enter the building. This safety upgrade provides an added layer of protection for the children and staff.



Frog Street Curriculum

Head Start has also adopted the Frog Street curriculum, a research-based program designed to support early childhood development through engaging, age-appropriate learning experiences. In October, two Lead Teachers and the Education Manager attended the “Cruising the Country” Frog Street Conference in Columbus, Ohio, gaining valuable hands-on training and classroom strategies to support implementation.

Weatherization

In March 2025, Mrs. Hayes was approved for Weatherization services. Following her approval, an Energy Audit was conducted. As part of this audit, several diagnostic tests were completed, including a blower door test, which measures how much air leakage is present in a home. Additional testing assessed the efficiency of the heating system and ductwork to determine how effectively conditioned air was being delivered throughout the home.

The findings showed that both the heating system and sections of the ductwork in Mrs. Hayes' home required replacement. The primary goal of the Weatherization program is to lower the blower door test number and reduce duct system pressure reading. Lowering the blower door test, along with improving duct pressure readings, indicates a successful improvement in the home's overall energy efficiency.



The Energy Audit also identified several additional measures needed to enhance both energy efficiency and household safety. A vapor barrier was installed to prevent ground moisture from damaging insulation or other materials below the home. Smoke alarms, combination smoke/CO alarms, a dryer vent kit, and a ventilation fan meeting ASHRAE standards were also installed.

Upon completion of the Weatherization work, the final blower door was reduced, clearly demonstrating an improvement in the home's energy performance.

The Weatherization crew also reduced ductwork pan readings to below one, ensuring that air from the heating and cooling system is moving properly into the home rather than leaking underneath it. Mrs. Hayes was extremely pleased with the quality of work completed in her home.

Repair & Replacement Program

On October 23, 2025, Trumpet Heating and Cooling crew began the installation of Mr. Squillace's new heating and cooling system. The team quickly removed the old trunk line and installed a new pristine trunk to ensure good air flow. After the trunk was installed, the crew completed the install of an indoor furnace with matching outdoor AC condenser.



Mr. Squillace stated that the contractor crew was very professional and worked quickly to restore heat and air to his home. He is pleased with the new unit and happy that he will no longer have to rely on a small heater to heat his home.

Our RRP staff continues to provide professional services as they perform HVAC installations in our designated counties.
